Report of the Trustees for 2015

The trustees, who act as directors for the purposes of company law, have pleasure in submitting their Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2015. The Annual General Meeting will be held on 22nd March, 2016 at the Hilton Brighton Metropole, Brighton. The following report was approved by the trustees at their meeting on 21st March, 2016.

Legal Status

The Political Studies Association of the United Kingdom, also known as the Political Studies Association, is a company limited by guarantee (number 3628986). The Political Studies Association is also a registered charity (number 1071825) and is subject to the provisions of the Charities Act 2011 and the rulings of the High Court with regard to charities generally. The charity is registered for VAT (number 620.3514.86). The members of the Executive Committee of the Association are the trustees of the charity and are personally accountable for the proper management of the Association and its assets. They are required to act prudently at all times in the best interests of the charity.

The Charities Act 2011 requires registered charities to make an annual return of accounts and activities. The Charities Act 2011, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 1995 and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice ('Charity SORP', latest version 2005) form the accounting framework for charities. The current guidance can be found on at www.charitycommission.gov.uk/charity requirements guidance/accounting and reporting/.

Objects and Membership

The Political Studies Association of the United Kingdom was founded in 1950. The charity is governed by its Articles of Association, last amended in 2010. The objectives of the Association, set out in clause 3 of the company's Articles of Association, are 'to promote the development of political studies and to encourage education and the advancement of learning in the art and science of government and in other branches of the political sciences'. Any person holding an appointment in political studies and allied subjects in an institute of higher education, and any other person whose participation is likely to be advantageous to political studies, may become a member. All members have equal rights although there are separate reduced rates of membership fee for students (including undergraduate and postgraduate students), people who are retired, and for teachers in schools. At the end of December 2015, the total membership stood at 1,884, compared with 1,826 at the end of 2014. There were 1,581 individual members in the UK (1,331 at the end of 2014), 82 (70) retired members, 356 (381) student/graduate members and 143 (165) teacher members. The Association's objective remains to grow the overall membership with a medium-term target of reaching some 2,000 members.



Trustees and Governance

The trustees of the Association are the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee normally meets four times a year. At the end of 2015 there were 16 trustees, of whom 10 were directly elected (including the Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer), and 6 were co-opted.

The Chair and Vice-Chair of the Association are co-opted following election by the Executive Committee and serve for three years. Professor Matthew Flinders and Professor Rosie Campbell respectively assumed these roles on 27th June 2014 and will stand down at the end of June 2017.

As part of the Chair's PSA+ reforms, new bye-laws setting out term limits for Executive Committee members were adopted on 26th June 2015. Under bye-law 4.6, an elected trustee can serve for up to a total of two elected terms of three years and one year as a co opted member (maximum 6 +1 years) but must then stand down from the Executive Committee for one full term (i.e. three years). Trustees can be co opted to the Executive for a maximum period of one year before having a break of at least one year before undertaking another co-option.

Appointment to the elected positions on the Executive Committee is determined through a ballot of all members. In 2015 the post of Honorary Treasurer came up for election. As just one nomination was received, no ballot for the post was needed and Professor Alasdair Blair was duly appointed for a three-year term at the Appointments Meeting held on 26th June 2015. Two other elected trustee posts also came up for election and as six valid nominations were received an electronic ballot of the members was conducted under an STV electoral system. The two winning candidates were Dr Meryl Kenny and Professor Will Jennings, who were formally appointed as trustees at the Appointments Meeting held on 26th June 2014.

In June 2015 the terms of four co-opted trustees Professor Andrew Massey expired and thus four positions became vacant. At the Appointments Committee held on 26th June 2015 Executive Committee approved the co-options of Prof. Matthew Goodwin, Dr Alison Statham, Dr Joanie Willett and Professor Angelia Wilson as members of the Executive serving for one year.

All the trustees who served in 2015 are listed on pages 1–2. No trustee receives any remuneration.

Much of the Association's work is undertaken by sub-committees of the Executive Committee. The sub-committees, all of which have written terms of reference, circulate information and consider issues by email, and take and ratify decisions at meetings between the quarterly Executive Committee meetings and at other times, as necessary.

The Postgraduate Network is run by its own committee and is expected to send a representative to all Executive Committee meetings.



Public Benefit

In preparing this report the trustees confirm that they have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, as set out in its publication *Charities and Public Benefit: the Charities Commission's general guidance on public benefit* (January 2008, amended December 2011) and subsequent postings on the Public Benefit section of its website.

The Charities Act 2011 sets out the following, among others, as charitable purposes:

- b) the advancement of education;
- f) the advancement of the arts, culture, heritage or science.

It also specifies a legal requirement "that every organisation set up for one or more charitable aims must be able to demonstrate that its aims are for the **public benefit** if it is to be recognised, and registered, as a charity in England and Wales". This is known as the public benefit requirement. There are two key principles, both of which must be met in order to show that an organisation's aims are for the public benefit:

Principle 1: There must be an identifiable benefit or benefits;

Principle 2: Benefit must be to the public, or a section of the public.

The Association has provided a benefit to the public by carrying out the activities listed in this report in accordance with its charitable object "to promote the development of political studies and to encourage education and the advancement of learning in the art and science of government and in other branches of the political sciences". As with other learned societies, public benefit derives not simply from membership of the Association but from the wider dissemination by the Association of knowledge about politics and political science through the charity's events, publications and free-to-view website at www.psa.ac.uk.

The Association's Journals

The Association owns four academic, peer-reviewed journals: *Political Studies, The British Journal of Politics & International Relations (BJPIR), Politics* and *Political Studies Review*. It also publishes, *Political Insight*, a full colour magazine-style journal, which aims to reach out to the wider community by making academic research accessible to practitioners, students and the general reader. Until the 31st December 2015 the contract to publish the journals was held by Wiley but on 1st January 2016 SAGE assumed responsibility for the publication of the PSA journals under the terms of a new five-year publishing contract. SAGE were selected as the Association's new publisher after a long and exhaustive selection process that began in 2014.



The terms negotiated with SAGE are extremely beneficial and provide the Association with a strong and secure flow of revenue through to the end of 2020 that will allow it to undertake a broader range of activities to further its charitable aims. The decision to award the contract to SAGE and the terms of the contract was approved by the Executive Committee and the contract with SAGE was signed in July 2015.

In June 2015 ISI released its Journal Citation Reports for 2014. In all cases the PSA's journals achieved a rise in their Impact Factors. *BJPIR* had an Impact Factor of 1.566 in 2014, up from 0.986 in the previous year, ranking it 16 of 85 in the category of International Relations and 32 of 161 in Political Science. *Political Studies* had an Impact Factor of 0.939 in 2014 compared to 0.869 to 2013, ranking it 59 of 161 in the category of Political Science. *Political Studies Review* was awarded an Impact Factor of 1.214, up from a score of 1.194 in 2013, ranking it 42 of 161 in the category of Political Science. *Politics* had an Impact Factor of 0.490 in 2014, ranking it 106 of 161 in the category of Political Science.

The term of the BJPIR editorial team came to an end in July 2015. At the end of 2014 applications were invited to take over the editorship of the journal and in February 2015, after a lengthy interview process, a team from the University of Edinburgh were selected as the new editors of the BJPIR. Led by Professor John Peterson and Dr Alan Convery, the team formally took over the post in August 2015.

Other Activities for the Public Benefit

The Political Studies Association engages in a range of activities open to members and non-members alike. As described in more detail in other sections of this report, the Association organises a large number of events and produces a range of publications that serve to promote the understanding and development of political studies.

Conferences and Events

The Political Studies Association arranges an annual conference (see **Sheffield International Conference** below), graduate conferences – through its Postgraduate Network – and conferences for Heads of Politics Departments. Its specialist groups also organise a wide range of conferences and events across the country (see **Specialist Groups** below).

In addition the Association organises a number of seminars and meetings, including an Annual Academic Lecture and an Annual Public lecture, both open to the public. The Academic Lecture, entitled *Women and Islamophobia: Refracted reflections, Muslims and the dilemma of 'otherisation'*, was delivered by Emeritus Professor Baroness Haleh Afshar at York University on 26th November and the Public Lecture, entitled Leadership, Loyalty and the Rise of



Jeremy Corbyn, was delivered by journalist Steve Richards at UCL on 15th October. In addition on 21st October, the Association celebrated the 800th anniversary of Magna Carta with an event to launch a new book, *Magna Carta and its Modern Legacy*, edited by Professor Robert Hazell and Dr James Melton.

Engagement

The Association has an important role to play in helping to inform public debate on key political issues by bringing the attention of the public, the media and policy-makers to the research and evidence base being produced by academics working in the field of political studies. It does so by organising briefings for the media on key issues in the news, encouraging members to submit evidence to select committee inquiries and putting forward the names of academic experts to select committee clerks.

For the fifth year, the PSA continued with its very successful programme of election media briefings. Three briefings were held over the course of March and April at the Institute for Government at which a selection of PSA academic members presented their latest research on the local elections, the state of the parties in the run-up to the general election and the latest election forecasts. Debate and discussion around the general election was also taken online as hundreds of people logged on and watched a series of Google Hangout discussions featuring academics, journalists and key figures from think tanks. The PSA also produced a directory of election experts for the media and at the Annual Conference in Sheffield over 20 academics were interviewed and questions about their election predictions with the resultant videos being uploaded to YouTube.

In addition to the high level of media requests at election time, the Association continues to respond to a steady volume of requests from journalists for examples of academic research relating to political issues in the news.

The Association regularly participates in government, parliamentary and research council consultations on issues for which it has particular expertise and/or which may have bearing on its own activities. In April the Associated submitted evidence to the Nurse Review of Research Councils, in October 2015 it submitted evidence to the House of Lords Constitution Committee Inquiry into the Union and Devolution and in November it responded to the Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS) Committee's inquiry into quality assessment in Higher Education. In November, following the publication by BIS of the Higher Education Green Paper 'Fulfilling our Potential: Teaching Excellence, Social Mobility and Student Choice', the PSA set up a joint working group with the British International Studies Association (BISA) and the UACES (formerly the University Association of Contemporary European Studies) to prepare a joint response. This was submitted in advance of BIS consultation deadline of 15th January 2016.



Parliamentary Internships

The House of Commons Committee Office paid Placements continued to be popular among our postgraduate members. In 2014/15 one postgraduate member was placed on the Political and Constitutional Reform Committee while for the 2015/16 term two PSA members have been placed on the Public Administration and Constitutional Affairs and Petitions Committees respectively.

Awards and Prizes

Each year the Association awards annual book, dissertation and lifetime achievement awards to academics. It also organises an awards event to celebrate the achievements of individuals and organisations in the field of politics, broadly defined, and political studies. In 2015 the Association's Annual Awards event, a dinner held on 1st December at Church House in London, attracted an especially distinguished guest list. It is clearly now firmly established as an event that attracts the attention and interest of senior politicians, journalists and other shapers and influencers of policy. The event was recorded by BBC Parliament and broadcast on numerous occasions on the channel.

Publications

The Association produces a wide range of publications. In addition to its academic journals (see **The Association's Journals** above), in 2015 it also produced *PSA News*, a quarterly magazine covering developments in political studies, and the *Directory of Political and International Studies*, which amongst other information provides lists and contact details for all those academic staff employed by politics departments in UK universities.

Schools

The Association continues to remain active in promoting the study of politics within schools through events, workshops and competitions. 2015 saw a whole series of exciting PSA Speakers for Schools visits take place around the UK. The initiative sees the Association facilitate academics presenting to school and college students on a variety of issues related to their sixth form studies.

During 2015 the PSA began to publish Teachers' Topic Guide as a means of supporting politics teachers in schools and there are now seven publications freely downloadable for teacher members from the PSA website with more planned for 2016.

In the summer, the PSA ran another successful 'applying to study politics at university' workshop series for perspective students. Around 250 students attended workshops which were held across 5 locations: Stirling, Manchester, Warwick, London, and Bristol.

In 2015 the PSA's Student Short Video Competition saw another increase in the number of entries with two students from the Graveney School in Tooting, South London winning the



competition which was again kindly judged by The Speaker of the House of Commons, John Bercow MP. As well as accepting a trophy at the PSA Annual Awards Ceremony the students have been offered a one-week internship with political polling company YouGov, who kindly sponsored the competition.

Communication with Members

The primary channels through which the Association communicates its activities and those of the political studies community with its members and the wider academic community are *PSA News*, which is published four times a year, a bi-weekly e-Newsletter, an official Twitter account and a website, www.psa.ac.uk. The Association also seeks to make information available to the wider public. A full-colour, 16 page Annual Report was printed for the second time by the Association in 2015 in order to improve communications with members and beyond. The report, which is available to download from the PSA website, outlined the activities of the Association in the previous year and is part of the organisation's commitment to transparency.

Promoting Equal Opportunities

The trustees, recognising the value of sustaining an inclusive environment, are committed to opposing discrimination within the discipline on the basis of gender or sexuality, ethnicity, race, nationality, age, physical ability, marital status, family responsibility, class, religion or ideological belief. These objectives are promoted by a Diversity and Equality Group. The Association now has an Equality and Diversity statement and strategy, both of which are available to access on the website. The strategy pledges a fresh commitment to equality and diversity and outlines a number of reforms and procedural changes which have been put in place by the PSA.

Overseas Links

PSA awards a large number of grants to members to support the presentation of research at overseas national PSA conferences. It also makes a number of awards to international visitors from overseas political science associations to the PSA Annual Conference. Total grant funding is more than £20,000 annually. In 2015, PSA members received funding to travel and present their research at the Annual Conferences of sister political science associations in countries such as Mexico and Canada. The Association also funded a number of scholars, some from as far away as South America and Australia, to present their research at the Annual Conference in Sheffield.

Research and Impact

A Research Excellence Framework (REF) working group, led by Professor Martin Lodge from the LSE, was established with BISA this year to help keep members informed about REF developments and to ensure that HEFCE and HEIs are aware of the views of the discipline.



Two new Research Commissions were also established in 2015 with PSA grant funding. In July, the first of the two commissions, chaired by Dr Sarah Ayers of Bristol University, was launched and will investigate how 'informal governance' is shaping devolution in English cities. The second Commission, chaired by Professor Shirin Rai of Warwick, is researching the crisis of care in austerity Britain. Both Commissions will report their findings in 2016.

The Political Studies Association was a founder member of the Academy of Social Sciences (AcSS). In 2015, the award of Fellow was conferred by the Council of the Academy on PSA nominee, Professor Karen Johnston of Glasgow Caledonia University.

Specialist Groups 2015

2015 saw the launch of two new groups: Latin American Politics and Political Violence & Terrorism Specialist Groups. In March 2015, the Elections, Public Opinion and Parties (EPOP) specialist group was announced as the 2014 Specialist Group of the Year at the PSA's Annual Conference dinner.

A special call was issued in November 2015 which invited proposals for joint events by PSA specialist groups and the American Political Science Association (APSA) organized sections. The scheme is intended to foster closer links between the associations and provide opportunities for research collaboration.

The 2015 Annual Specialist Group Convenors' Conference was held on Thursday 10th December, 2015 at the Institute for Government, London. The conference included key sessions for convenors and officers on financial arrangements for 2016, online communications and two demonstrations of shared practice on wider impact and engagement with practitioners and the media, as well as the development of e-resources and expanding the reach of specialist groups. Equality and diversity training was also provided to those attending.

Education and Skills

The issue of A-level reforms continued to be the key area of focus during 2015 for the PSA. Over the course of the year the Association responded to OFQUAL's consultation on A level curriculum reform; made a formal submission to the DfE's draft subject content consultation and continued to foster stronger links with the exam boards, including a meeting in January with representatives of each of the main awarding bodies for teacher members. This is an ongoing and important element of the Association's work, with the PSA now being viewed as the leading organization to champion the discipline within schools to Government and the awarding bodies.



Sheffield International Conference

The PSA held its 65th Annual International Conference in Sheffield at the Town Hall and City Hall from 30th March to 1st April. The theme of the conference was "Civic Pride". Over 600 delegates from around the world attended the event. The keynote speakers were Professor John Dryzek from the University of Canberra, Professor John Curtice from Strathclyde University, Dr Rob Ford from the University of Manchester and Professor Randall Hansen from the University of Toronto.

The main conference dinner was held in the Grade 1 listed Cutlers Hall Building, during which Rt. Hon John Bercow MP, Speaker of the House of Commons, provided the Annual Dinner speech on the topic 'Reforming Parliament: A Process not an Event'.

Treasurer's Report for 2015

The financial management of the Political Studies Association of the United Kingdom is undertaken by the Chief Executive, the Finance Officer and the Treasurer, in liaison with other staff and the Finance Sub-Committee. Members of the Sub-Committee are Matt Flinders, Paul Carmichael and Angie Wilson and the Treasurer, with the Chief Executive and Finance Officer in attendance. Reports are prepared for meetings of the Finance Sub-Committee, the Management Committee and the trustees and Executive Committee. The CEO has operational responsibility to ensure the decisions taken by the Executive Committee are carried out.

Provision of information to the auditor

Each of the persons who were directors at the time when this report was approved has confirmed that:

- so far as that director is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditor is unaware;
- the director has taken all the steps that ought to have been taken as a director in order to be aware of any information needed by the company's auditor in connection with preparing its report and to establish that the company's auditor is aware of that information.

Incoming Resources during 2015

Total incoming resources during 2015 were £921,843 compared with £783,254 in 2014. The principal reason for the rise of 17 per cent was a one-off transfer fee of £150,000 from SAGE on award of the PSA journal publishing contract.

One of the main sources of income for the Association is subscriptions paid by members. In 2015 this amounted to £111,553 compared to £102,565 in 2014.

Income from our outgoing journal publisher, Wiley fell by 5 per cent from £511,279 in 2014 to £487,185 in 2015.

Expenditure during 2015

The total resources expended by the charity during 2015 were £757,952, compared with £730,154 in 2014.

Staffing costs rose from £221,834 in 2014 to £249,687 in 2015 reflecting in part the addition of a Finance Officer based in London who took office in April 2015 and salary increases to reflect market conditions.

The pay of senior management personnel is reviewed annually and normally increase in accordance with average earnings and set at market rates.

All trustees give of their time freely and no trustee remuneration was paid in the year. Details of trustee expenses and related party transactions are disclosed in note 17 to the accounts.



Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them with the Chair of Trustees and in accordance with the Boards policy withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises.

The total costs for running the national office, excluding staffing costs, were £69,217 in 2015, compared to £62,627 in the preceding year.

Education and Skills rose from £17,287 in 2014 to £21,212 in 2015 reflecting our increasing engagement with our teacher members and schools, and our greater focus on promoting teaching and learning.

Outgoings on research and impact rose significantly from £30,326 in 2014 to £51,103 in 2015. In large part due to the award of £10,000 to two new research commissions, increased expenditure in specialist groups and the creation of a new REF working group in association with BISA.

Reserves, Investments and Risks

Reserves: The Charity's reserves policy and the level of reserves are reviewed each year having regard to the Charity Commission publication CC19, 'Charities and Reserves' (June 2010 revision), and a forecast of income and expenditure is prepared for the following year.

The reserves policy adopted by the trustees on 29 October 2005 is that free reserves should amount to at least 1.5 times the level of expenditure. As shown in the statement of financial activities, total funds carried forward on 31 December 2015 were £1,460,875, representing almost 2 times the annual expenditure in 2015.

Investments: The charity's policy on investments over many years has been to place the Association's funds in low-risk investments. As a result of this policy, the Association has not experienced the losses suffered by many other charities following the periodic falls in the value of stocks and shares. The policy has been kept under review and is discussed at the financial review meetings.

During 2015 most of the Association's reserves were deposited in the Virgin Charity deposit account which currently earns 1.3 per cent, Bank of Scotland 32-day deposit account earning .02% above bank base rate and Bank of Scotland call account. In financial review meetings, it has been agreed that since interest rates are currently very low it would be difficult to expect any significant returns on low-risk investments, but that the trustees should keep the position under review. The Association's trustees feel the approach that has been adopted is sensible and appropriate in the current difficult climate.

Risks: The Political Studies Association faces various risks, many of a financial nature. Although the PSA is guaranteed £500,000 per year five years to 2021, over the long term there is a risk income could decline. This might occur for various reasons, most notably a fall in subscriptions as a result of the introduction of the government's open access policy, a disadvantageous exchange rate, company failure by the publishers or their agents, or mistakes in apportioning income



from the journals. The position is monitored closely with a monthly report for the Association on income to the journals' account and meetings with the publishers on sales and income held as necessary.

It is also possible that the level of the Association's membership might fall, leading to a reduction in income from that source. The current changes in funding for higher education could lead to circumstances in which membership declined and the position will need to be monitored and any necessary action taken.

On the expenditure side, it is possible that there could be over-spending by one or more of the committees, or an employee or agent of the Association could enter into unwise large-scale commitments – although there are tight controls to guard against these eventualities. As the Association employs more staff and expands into new areas of activity so the range of possible risks may expand too. Other risks include the possibility of various kinds of legal action against the charity. The Association holds insurance against certain risks and this continues to be kept under review.

The trustees keep all major risks under review, take advice as necessary and seek to mitigate the risks. The principal reason for the reserves policy is to ensure that the Association has sufficient funds to guard against unforeseen eventualities. The PSA maintains and updates periodically the Risk Register.

Financial Assessment

Current Position: This is the first report of the current Treasurer following 22 years of sterling service from the outgoing treasurer, John Benyon, and it is pleasing to report that the charity continues to run a surplus of £163,891 in 2015 (£53,100 in 2014). As a result, the Association's funds carried forward rose to £1,460,875 (from £1,296,984 at the end of 2014), represented by £1,487,486 (£1,279,196 in 2014) in its bank accounts, plus £106,738 (£123,147 in 2014) due from debtors, less liabilities and deferred income of £133,349 (£105,359 in 2014).

The Association continues to enjoy good financial health. Over several years, activities have grown and so has income. Alongside rising activities and the increased profile of the Association, the number of members has continued to increase. For over a decade the Political Studies Association of the United Kingdom has experienced a virtuous circle of growing activities, additional publications, increased professionalism, better international links, a heightened reputation and profile, and a rising membership. The steady pace of growth has enabled the charity to build its reserves while expanding and developing its activities. The Association continues to prosper and finds itself in good financial shape and can look forward with confidence.

Plans for the Future Period: The trustees will continue to keep a close watch on risks and on uncertainties about future income and expenditure. Income from the Association's journals will need careful monitoring. The growth of open access and electronic publishing, cutbacks in



library budgets, and the expansion in the use of licensing arrangements, are factors the effects of which cannot be predicted with any certainty. Any decline in income from the journals, or from other sources, will require imaginative responses.

Given the uncertainties around income and expenditure, there is clearly a need for continued care and prudence, in accordance with the Association's policy on risks and their mitigation. This will entail increasing income where possible and maintaining a tight watch on expenditure, while being prepared to invest in new developments in furtherance of the charity's overall goal of promoting political studies and the advancement of learning in the art and science of government.

Concluding Comments

This is the first report that I have had the pleasure of writing and I am extremely grateful to the advice and support that I have received from everyone who has assisted me in undertaking these duties. I am particularly grateful to the support of John Benyon who after 22 years of service has left the Association in very strong financial health. Over the last year I have worked particularly closely with Chair of the Association, Matthew Flinders, the Vice-Chair, Rosie Campbell, and the Honorary Secretary, Paul Carmichael. I am most grateful to the advice and guidance provided by the Chief Executive, Helena Djurkovic, and Shazia Ijaz, the Association's Finance, Planning and Resources Officer. Shazia in particular has been a great source of advice and brings to the Association a wealth of financial expertise which is critical to undertaking the task of managing the Association's finances. I would also like to express my gratitude to other members of the Executive Committee for their support and assistance, as well as to the editors of the Association's Journals. I would also like to express by thanks to the staff at BDO, the Association's Auditors, as well as to the staff at Wiley and SAGE.

Finally, in reflecting on this report, it is evident that while the Association has the benefit of a significant reserve and the journal deal with SAGE, there are nonetheless notable challenges in the years ahead, both with regard to investment returns as well as to diversifying income streams. These are matters which the Executive Committee are reviewing as evidenced by such initiatives as the Chair's Commissions.

1 Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities.

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Incoming resources

The principle sources of income are as disclosed in the Statement of Financial Activities. All income is accounted for on a receivable basis. Membership subscriptions received in advance are initially accounted for as deferred income and transferred to revenue by equal annual instalments over the period covered by the subscriptions.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Charitable activities include expenditure directly relating to the objects of the charity and those relating to the general running of the charity, including strategic planning processes that contribute to future development.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Funds

All income is available for the trustees to use for any purpose in furtherance of the charitable objectives. No restricted funds are centrally held.

Taxation

Political Studies Association of the United Kingdom is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pensions

The charity is a member of a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

2 Legal Status of the Charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to £10.
