

Call for contributors, *Trends in International Political Science*

The International Political Science Association (IPSA) and the *International Political Science Abstracts* is launching a new project, *Trends in International Political Science* to contribute to developing a community of political science scholars world-wide. Our editorial office receives over 30,000 articles every year from around the globe, providing us with an unparalleled access to articles published in and around our discipline. *Trends* seeks to build on this material to determine 6 topics in the field. We gather leading articles on that trend over the last 2-4 years and seek scholars with expertise in that area to write a short (3500-4000 words) review in English of these works. A *Trends* article will then be published as the first chapter of each bi-monthly issue of the *International Political Science Abstracts*, and distributed to libraries around the world in both print and database editions.

We are currently soliciting authors to write articles on the following subjects:

- 1) Autocratic Backsliding
- 2) Conspiracy Theories
- 3) Environmental Activism
- 4) Covid 19 and Populism
- 5) Security Politics and Artificial Intelligence
- 6) Democratic Legitimacy

Authors will receive an honorarium of 500 euros, which may be shared with a co-author.

Following selection, we will contact you with the relevant article titles and abstracts and expect a first draft of the Trends article by October 15, 2022.
